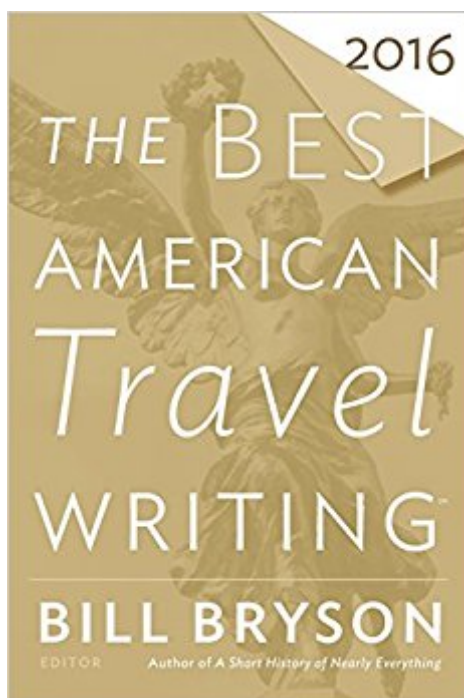

I've been reading and collecting BATW volumes since 2000, and for years it has been one of the highlights of my yearly reading list. But for the third year in a row the collection disappoints to the point of being irritating. Either the genre is in steep decline or series editor Jason Wilson has run his course and needs to move on to new endeavors, giving someone else a chance to breath new life into the series. Until the publisher makes a change I doubt I'll be buying or reading future editions.

This latest entry in the *Best American Travel Writing* series includes more heavy, issue-based stories than its predecessors, covering topics like climate change, the status of indigenous people, and nuclear radiation. It also has some slow spots; unfortunately many of the longest stories are not the best. There are some great highlights though, including Pico Iyer's exploration of foreignness, Sara Corbett's exploration into the mysteries of Japanese culture and Michael Chabon's story of

being happily lost in Morocco. Patrick Symmes' gentle condemnation of travelers who want to see Cuba "before it changes" was a revelation, and Patricia Marx's essay on plastic surgery provided fascinating insight into Korea. The short foreword by Jason Wilson and Introduction by Bill Bryson are also entertaining.

Not actually "travel writing." It would be more accurately titled "Research Writing with Foreign Theme." Bill Bryson's intro was the only true travel writing in the book, and the best written part. The rest were explorations of smuggling, plastic surgery, other topics that happened to be centered in other countries. Precious little about traveling. Interesting. But misleading.

Bryson did not write this book, he edited it. Bryson is one of the best writers and has superb books, all of which I have read. Though written by others, it is a good read.

I like most of what I've read written by Bill Bryson and now I can say I like what he's overseen as editor. Nice variety of essays, all well-written, none self-conscious. None stands out as exemplary of the best travel writing but I didn't regret reading any.

Loving it so far- each chapter is like a miniature story (perhaps obviously, as it's a compilation of many different articles) but it's so easy to get invested in each piece and Bryson has done a great job picking them out and gathering them together.

I read this compilation every year and it never disappoints.

This is an uneven collection. Odd that Bryson put his name on it, because not much reflects the quality or wit in his writing. Some pieces are good, thoughtful, but most are sleep inducers.
