


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The New Grove Guide To Wagner And His Operas (New Grove Operas)

This is a physically and verbally thin book. I was surprised at how disappointingly cursory its survey of its subject is (in works and life). To justify this thin gruel as 'intended for beginners' is false given that anyone with an interest in the subject will want quite a bit more than capsule plot summaries of legendary operas with a few short basic essays. Whatever you are looking for, this can hardly be the book you want. You will almost certainly want much more, as I did - this book just begins to whet the appetite without providing much you haven't already read in little CD-set libretto booklets. It's a lazily-constructed volume relying like a crutch on your natural assumption that because it has been published as a book its content justifies such an independent and specific existence.

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
