


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Taken

From the back cover blurb and the reputation of the author, I expected this book to be exciting and suspenseful. I was disappointed. The pace was extremely slow and there was no excitement at all. The only reason I kept reading was to see what would happen. And nothing did, at least not "on stage." All the excitement was behind the scenes. We never find out what happened to Shannon while she was in captivity, how exactly she got free, what was in her diaries, etc. All we get is the POV of the retired cop who tells us what Shannon is thinking, how she's going to act. what will happen long-term. There are no surprises and the story line is a bit unrealistic. Shannon shows no fear, just anxiety. She's extremely sure of herself, which I find strange from a victim. She does not fear retribution. And besides that, she takes her photos to an art dealer and finds out she is an instant millionaire. How believable is that? The book is at least 100 pages too long. The author could have eliminated all the descriptions of what and then they ate, which seemed to be all the time, and left out descriptions of setting. What happened to the conflict in the story? Everything goes so smoothly, it's boring and noneventful. I hate to give bad reviews, but I was extremy surprised by the lack of many elements of a good book in this one. We read it in our book club, and everyone felt the same way - waiting for something to happen and nothing did.

As a fan of Dee Henderson's, I expect to read a well written, interresting, reasearched book. Taken was that. What it wasn't, was realistic on the personal front. The characters were believeable, but

not real. The story line was great, and had newsworthy tones. But the romance was nearly non-existant, and certainly not realistic. I aplaud the main character's faith, and her belief in God's timing. What wasn't there, was God's grace, and most especially, His healing. Several of Ms Henderson's books deal with gut-wrenching pain and grief, but do not deal with the simple healing grace of God. Total healing, complete rejuvenation. He can do it!All in all, a good book, but I expected better.

Well, I've read all of the Dee Henderson's books, and I have loved them all - this one included. What I enjoy most is the way Dee tells the story of what is going on in the minds and emotions of the characters. All of her characters are complex, smart, intuitive, rich, compassionate, and flawed. Their flaws leave room for their faith to be examined by the reader and to be expanded and found trustworthy by the characters. I like that. Taken is probably not my favorite of Dee's books, and I'm not sure why. I plan to read it again to see if I can figure out the reason that the book leaves me feeling uneasy. Maybe it is the age difference between the main characters; maybe it is the window into a type of crime that I have heard very little about; maybe it is because the female main character - who is so strong and precise in her escape - doesn't seem to grow in her strength as the threads of her captivity are finally unraveled and then tied off. Nevertheless, this was an interesting "story" that I would certainly recommend to anyone.

Dee Henderson was one of my favorite author. I have read the $O\tilde{A}f\hat{A}\phi\tilde{A}$ \hat{a} $\neg\tilde{A}$ \hat{a} , ϕ Malley series several time. However, I do not like the recent books as much and did not like this one at all. It was too procedural for me. I also did not feel a romantic connection between the two. Although I did not sense the romance between the two, there did appear to be a little Stockholm syndrome going on between Shannon and Flynn. Another thing that I did not like is how Shannon decided how and when justice would be played out, such as sparing Flynn and her mother from the justice they may have deserved. I understand that it would have been difficult for Shannon to deal with her mother being questioned or arrested for the kidnapping, however, one of the kidnapper's identified her and I do not think that it was Matthew's position to come to the conclusion that she was not involved and keep the evidence from the authorities. His personal opinion was only done to make it easier for Shannon to deal with what happened to her. Something I hope a respectable police with integrity and who is a Christian, would not do. I got the impression the mother was responsible for the original kidnapping, but did not expect it to turn out the way it did. Another thing, the fact that this dangerous criminal family did nothing to find her was unrealistic for me. I kept expecting them to

turn up. The fact that she came and went as she pleased after going through such a horrific event was unrealistic. Also, Shannon mentioned to Matthew that she would like to know how she would react to a kiss, given how bad the memories are of some others that she would rather forget. An interesting statement to make, was she raped or molested? Very little information about what actually happened to her accept for the diaries that she gave Matthew was given. But other than saying that it was difficult for him to read, we heard very little about what was written in them. Finally, Shannon suddenly becoming a millionaire by selling her pictures was also unbelievable. I will read the other books that Dee Henderson writes, because I usually purchase them as soon as I hear about them and have already purchased the one coming out in October. But if this is what I can expect, I will probably not purchase her books again.

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
