My wife ordered this for me. We are big fans of The Offie and she got this for me as a little present. I've never read a collection of short stories before, so I didn't know exactly what to expect. From what I understand, my experience has been atypical. BJ Novak weaves characters and stories together throughout his work in a way that is humorous and heartwarming. There are some adult themes throughout the book, so reader-beware. But it is overall a funny, though-provoking collection

of stories and musings. Also, there is a great podcast from Studio Q where BJ Novak explains his process in writing this book that is definitely worth a listen!

This is the book for my short breaks. I love B.J. Novak whimsical short stories. Some stories really hit home, like "One More Thing." Some are light-hearted. But I love the fact that I can open the book at any time and reread any short story in 5 minutes and take my mind off life for a little.

J.D. Salinger, master of short stories, once had Seymour chide his brother Buddy for being too witty; a writer who indulged his penchant for cleverness ostensibly was like a cripple drawing attention to his club foot. Or something like that. The idea has stuck with me for many years and I have faulted even my favorite authors for 'cracking themselves up' and taking me out of their story. However, in reading Novak's collection, it suddenly occurred to me that in many ways, a good short story is like a well told joke. You have an intro, a build-up and a punch-line...not necessarily funny, but the more provocative the better. And if it does make you chuckle, where's the harm in that? Especially if you see it leading there all along and like the good 'laugher' in the comedy club, you surrender to the fun. Novak's experience in stand-up has certainly taught him how to tell a story well. His wry observations of current culture will make you want to share. I predict the term 'recalculating' as he employed it will soon be as over-used as the ubiquitous 'awesome'. Or perhaps it already is in some circles and he is first to point it out. You will see yourself or people you know in this collection $\tilde{A}f\hat{A}\phi\tilde{A}$ \hat{a} $\neg \tilde{A}$ \hat{a} *as well as celebrities $\tilde{A}f\hat{A}\phi\tilde{A}$ \hat{a} $\neg \tilde{A}$ \hat{a} *brought down to earth with foibles exposed. Somehow though, as with all great storytellers, their humanity does not make them tragic heroes, but lovable ones.

I'm 56% finished with the book, I may update when I'm 100% done, but so far it has been fantastic. I got to this book by reading "The Bassoon King" by Rainn Wilson (check it out, it's good stuff), so I'm reading from a Ryan from The Office type voice. Some of the stories have changed that, but overall the smart, somewhat pretentious language and sentence structure screams "Ryan". Anyway, the book has been fantastic, a wonderful mixture of short and even shorter stories that connect at appropriate times and rest comfortably between funny and thought-provoking.
