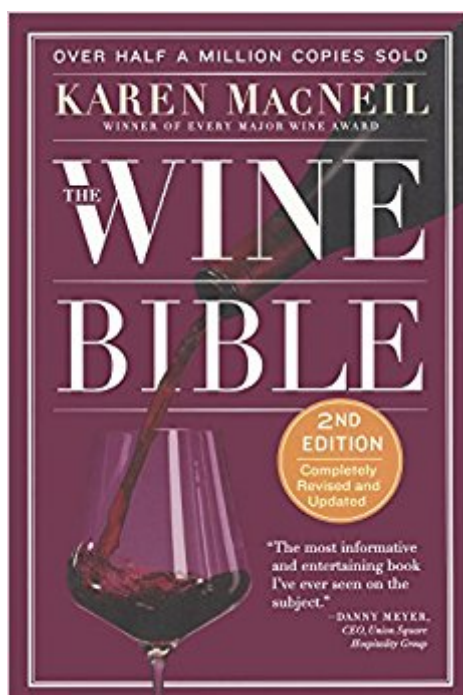

I bought the first edition of this incredible tome in 2015. As an ardent winelover for the past fifty years, I fully appreciate the dedication and passion that went into writing it. But MacNeil didn't just write it, she submitted the chapters to literally dozens of experts in their specialty for review. That is how it took TEN years to write! How good was it? Good enough to take a two pound book with me to the Basque Country of Spain! I own more than a dozen wine books, most of which gather dust on my bookshelf...not that one, it is a constant companion! Imagine, a book that took TEN years to write, TEN years ago, and is still valuable. Wait, isn't that a bible? If you read the reviews of it, you will find only two complaints: when will she write a new edition, and the weight. Oh, one more: why nothing on Temecula wines? Finally, ten years and 4,000 pages of manuscript later, we got our wish...and more, because of all the changes, THE most valuable is the Kindle edition! Portable, quick and easy to search, and dozens of other new features. As a wine advocate and aficionado who is a blogger and is working on a book project on wine, or more accurately the passion of the people who make them, this is a huge help to me. I have been asked what wines I would take if I was going to a deserted island. I cannot narrow the list down, but as for what wine book I would take, this is it! Oh, and even Temecula gets mentioned, as well as upcoming regions like

Slovenia! Thank you, Karen!

The Wine bible is one our text books in a Stanford University on-line class: The geology and wines of California and France. The "bible" is packed with useful information and the easy to read and filled with cross references and back stories that enliven the topics. If you have any kind of a question about wine, vineyards, wine history, terroir, wine regions, wine making, tasting terms, and seemingly anything else about wine, you will find the answer and more in the MacNeil's thoroughly referenced book.

I am in the wine business and writing about wine all the time to make journalists' life as easy as possible. This book is my go to source for fact checking. Karen MacNeil is one of the most trusted sources in this country for information on everything wine, the way the Larousse des Vins or the Encyclopedie des Vins et Alcools from Alexis Lichine was for me when I first started in the biz 30 years ago, except it is talking about wines from all over the world, not just France. And for the ones who are looking to learn more about wine, it is well organized, easy to digest and extremely comprehensive, while including witty bits and visuals throughout. Highly recommended.

This is a great book if you are starting out to learn about wines I bought it because I was taking a wine course and it was super helpful. It reads well where you do not feel like you are reading a boring textbook. BIG plus. It talks about different countries and their wines. Well the ones that are the most popular that you would come by. It brings you in first by asking what is a good wine? It goes through the process of wine making about the soil, locations, and the length of time the wine stays in oak to create the different flavours. It also talks about the grapes that make the wine and how that gives the flavour. It gives you wine terms not only in English but also in other languages. So YES you can sound fancy when speaking "wine" with others ;) I say buy it.

I was so thrilled to get this newly revised version of The Wine Bible and Karen MacNeil did a wonderful updated version. I loved the first version and read and reread parts of it, to learn about wines and their regions. This revised version has a lot of updated information. Two good examples are the sections on American wines and New Zealand wines. Virginia has been improving in their wines for some years and Karen MacNeil has brand new comments and suggestions about them, with specific recommendations. For New Zealand, which has been a greatly up and coming region, and this no version has a lot of new information about it. There is no book out there like the Wine Bible. The author goes into such great detail about to compare regions, explaining fascinating cultural or historical regional information to particular wines or grapes.

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
