


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Wide Open: My Adventures In Polyamory, Open Marriage, And Loving On My Own Terms

Gracie X—a suburban mother of two—has been married to her loving husband, Hank, for 25 years. The problem is that their once-vibrant sex life has shriveled to nothing. Meanwhile, she has fallen in love with another man, for whom she has an overwhelming physical yearning. Frustrated and conflicted but determined not to give up her hard-won home life and wonderful husband, she is desperate for a creative solution. A A Can she somehow keep both men in her life without resorting to divorce or dishonesty? A friend introduces Gracie to polyamory: loving and being faithful to more than one person at a time. "Poly, \tilde{A} ¢â ¬ \hat{A} • it turns out, is a whole new world, with dedicated counselors, parties, and dating sites. Convincing Hank ended up being the easy part: he guickly found a girlfriend and accepted Gracieââ ¬â,,¢s terms. I got this book on recommendation from a friend thinking it would be a fun little voyeuristic romp of a read. Boy did I get more than I bargained for. Don't get me wrong, it is a fun titillating read with many laugh-out-loud moments. It also is the most thought-provoking book I've read in a very long time. This book tells it all on so many different levels. It is a multiple-love story. Gracie writes poignantly about her love for her husband, Hank, her children and the family they're all part of. She writes about falling in love with Oz, and trying to put that love away to maintain her family. Ultimately, she realizes that she needs to do something different but has no idea what that would look like. She starts to unpack what family, marriage, love and sex mean to her. Following her heart, (sometimes down some blind alleys), she is ultimately able to create a non-traditional vision of

family which works for all of them. Gracie takes the reader along on the ride, confessing her innermost thoughts, feelings, desires and frustrations. She pulls no punches, least of all on herself. Her writing mixes moxie, sheer determination and terrible uncertainty, erotic energy and vulnerability. It's an incredibly fun read, one which I couldn't put down. I finished it a few days ago, but it's still in my head. It's helping me unpack questions about my own life. What parts of it would I like to change, and how would I have the guts to do it.

If you are looking something to help you To understand what means or want to be sure that polyamory is the perfect relationship for you? This will not be the book for you. This book is more about a woman who became polyamory and is telling her own experiences. Did. It help me at all. As a person that just start a relationship with a marriage man and his wife. But if you are looking for a book to help you to educate you and help you and your polyamory relationship. I suggest to try "Some one you love is Polyamory" or "Love more than Two" by Franklin Veaux.

Gracie X tells a sometimes funny, sometimes moving, and always engaging tale of love in the 21st-century. Monogamy is not quite as mandatory as it was a couple of decades ago, and there $\tilde{A}f\hat{A}\phi\tilde{A}$ \hat{a} $\neg\tilde{A}$ \hat{a},ϕ s a growing acceptance of other options. But navigating those options and figuring out one $\tilde{A}f\hat{A}\phi\tilde{A}$ \hat{a} $\neg\tilde{A}$ \hat{a},ϕ s own authentic love style is not always easy. intentional exploration, and where she lands is somewhat unconventional but far from extreme. The possibilities, however, are wide open, and it $\hat{A}f\hat{A}\phi\hat{A}$ \hat{a} $\neg\hat{A}$ \hat{a},ϕ s that openness that made it possible for the author to land where she did.

All through this book, I could relate and then not as the author and main character found her way through life and figuring out what she wanted and needed. I cheered her on from afar, even though some part of me felt that this triangle she found herself in was not Polyamory the way I knew it yet who are we to decide what is what to anyone else? In the end, I'm just glad that things found a way to work out for everyone involved in this story.

Interesting.... I was just curious about the lifestyle and wanted to read up on it. But I wonder....has this worked for anyone else?

This book was incredibly entertaining and insightful. Gracie conveyed intense moments of pain, humor, concern, and enlightenment in her journey to a poly life. However, midway through the book I got this overwhelming feeling that everybody and every thing was a satellite that orbited Gracie. She came across as the queen of wanting to have her cake while eating it and nothing was too high of a price to pay in order to have both. I lost count of the number of times where I asked out loud, "is she serious?" Don't get me wrong, I'm all for self-discovery and getting what you want but, sometimes you have to be able to appreciate the costs. Despite the many positives, I think I ended up not liking her very much.

Certainly thought provoking and entertaining. With some brilliant writing, this book is an open and honest exploration of intimacy with self and others. It is about more than just sex - though Gracie $\tilde{A}f\hat{A}\phi\tilde{A}$ \hat{a} $\neg\tilde{A}$ \hat{a} , ϕ s life is well spiced in this regard - it is about creative relationships and family.
