


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# Gardnerââ,¬â,,¢s Art Through The Ages: A Global History, Volume I (with ArtStudy Printed Access Card And Timeline)

Kleiner (Ph.D., Columbia University) is the author or co-author of the 10th, 11th, 12th, 13th, 14th, and 15th editions of ART THROUGH THE AGES: A GLOBAL HISTORY, as well as the 1st, 2nd, and 3rd editions of ART THROUGH THE AGES: A CONCISE HISTORY, and more than 100 publications on Greek and Roman art and architecture, including A HISTORY OF ROMAN ART, also published by Cengage. He has taught the art history survey course for more than three decades, first at the University of Virginia and, since 1978, at Boston University, where he is currently professor of art history and archaeology. From 1985 to 1998, he was editor-in-chief of the American Journal of Archaeology. Long acclaimed for his inspiring lectures and dedication to students, Professor Kleiner won Boston University's Metcalf Award for Excellence in Teaching, as well as the College Prize for Undergraduate Advising in the Humanities in 2002, and he is a two-time winner of the Distinguished Teaching Prize in the College of Arts and Sciences Honors Program. In 2007, he was elected fellow of the Society of Antiquaries of London, and, in 2009, in recognition of lifetime achievement in publication and teaching, fellow of the Text and Academic Authors Association.

This provides an engaging, though, well written overview of the art of the civilizations it covers. The book is profusely illustrated with color photographs - at least one per page - that directly pertain to the objects and styles under consideration. I was VERY pleasantly surprised by the quality, scholarship and coverage of this book. I very highly recommend it.

Although the description for the Kindle version mentions the coursepack, it is not actually available for electronic versions of the book. In the Kindle version there were no page numbers associated with the subjects in the index, rendering it useless. No page numbers throughout the text, either. There were no navigational aids, so I had to flip page by page to get back to the table of contents. Reading the materials was cumbersome, because so little of the text appeared on the screen. I returned the Kindle version and bought the book instead. The book itself is beautifully illustrated with excellent content.

I have several complaints. The first is the most serious. The Kindle electronic version is barely readable because the spacing between is uneven or incorrect. Considering that the kindle version cost more than \$50.00, I think it's highway robbery to continue selling a defective edition. I would have returned it, but it is required reading for my art history class. The 2nd comment is that the text or writing is extremely dense, i.e. it is not an easy read. I am a good reader with advanced degrees

-- so it's not me.

The Kindle version is just plain bad. There are lots of errors, fonts that are spaced to make reading very difficult, etc. The Book is much better. Whoever put out the kindle version has neither pride, nor skill in their job, which is important with this type of book. Get the book version instead.

I had to use it for a Freshman college course and found it to be very helpful. In fact, I'm currently using it for an upper-div art class. It's very thorough and gives you some great background/contextual info on the artists and the process of creation.
