


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Danica: Crossing The Line

This book would be great if it were intended for a younger, largely female audience of go-karting

enthusiasts aspiring to progress in the sport of racing. As a book intended for an adult audience, it leaves much to be desired. Better to be inspired by the established greats of the sport, of which there are many, whose racing records speak for themselves.

The actual book is fine, but was not received as described. There were 2 sticky residue marks on the front and back covers, where there most likely had been a "sale" sticker. Can't get it off!! There were also a few pages that were bent/folded on the inside.

A fun and fast read, this book gives the reader a glimpse into the early years of Danica Patrick's racing career. I was fascinated by all the intricate factors that can affect each race. Watching the races, be it Formula 1 (covered in this book) or Nascar, it always looks easy - hey, they just drive

around an oval track with some curves and turns here and there: how hard can that be? Very hard! Not only do drivers have to take in the weather issues (wind, rain, etc.), rises in the track (like the slants on the turns), debris such as oil on the track, but they also have to think about how physically fit they are to drive the car (mega-G force resistance when trying to hold onto that steering wheel), and the fact that they can only see what's directly in front of the car, so they have to rely on someone else to tell them when to move over and when to pass; it's such a technical sport. A race car driver also has to listen to their crew advise them on their fuel mix ratio, which effects how long their fuel will last. I remember watching one race where Danica was told to slow down her speed to conserve fuel and she lost the race. I think people have been extremely critical and unfairly critical of Danica and I do believe it is because she is a woman. At least 50% of the men racing Formula 1 and Nascar will never be as good a driver as Danica. In fact, Danica just finished her 2016 season ranked at number 24 out of 62 racers; ahead of greats like Paul Menard (ranked #25), Clint Bower (ranked at #27), and Dale Earnhardt (ranked at #32). However, the men do not get criticized to the level that Danica does, even when she out-races them. Hopefully, this book will enlighten people to how hard racing really is and inspire others to get involved rather than just sit on the sidelines and criticize.

Unfortunately, Danica only succeeds in reinforcing the cliches she vows to avoid. Although she gives some insights into the rigours of IRL racing, she spends too many pages on her personal life, family and emotions, and not enough on the racing and its challenges. Can't really recommend this one I'm afraid.

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
