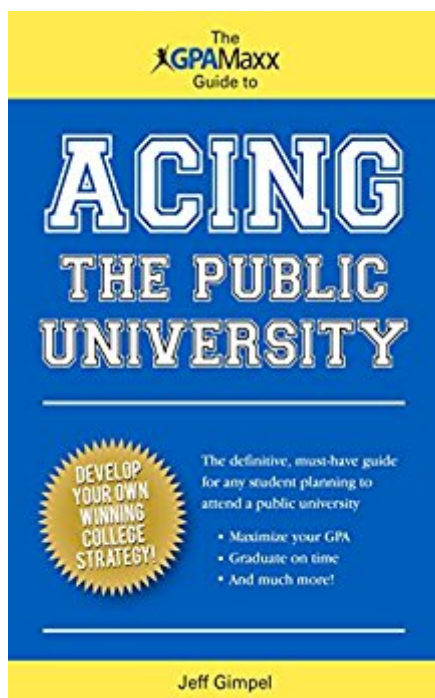


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The GPAMaxx Guide To Acing The Public University

It's no secret that most of us parents are focused on getting our kids admitted into a college. There are hundreds of books which we can choose from to help us with the college admissions process. There are, however, precious few books that help students with the next step once they get admitted to a college: successfully transitioning from high school to college. To the best of my knowledge, there are none designed with students in mind who will be attending a state university. Until this book, that is! Given that state support for state universities has declined by more than 25 percent over the last three decades, students today cannot assume that they will get quality academic advising on campus. On most state school campuses, there are hundreds of students for each academic advisor. As a result, students need to make sure they arrive for their first semester able to be their own academic advisors and make well-informed and strategic academic planning decisions independently. As parents, we therefore owe it to our children to ensure that they have this ability before they head off to college. Fortunately, *Acing the Public University* gives students the tools and acumen that they need to advise themselves and make strategic academic planning decisions on their own. It shows

students in an easy to read and systemic fashion how to develop a comprehensive college completion plan. It lays out exactly how students need to go about doing this (Step 1, Step 2, etc.). I rarely write actual reviews (preferring instead to just pick the right number of stars and move on), but this book is such a great resource that I had to spread the word with actual words! This book provides a fresh (and refreshing) perspective on what it takes to achieve success in college, and spells out an effective way to get there. Although expressly written for public universities, the main lessons and strategies for achievement could be applied to just about any institution of higher learning. The basic premise is that most students not only don't know how to strategize their college career for maximum effectiveness at the lowest cost, but also don't even realize they need to have such a strategy. This book provides a solid introduction to the problem as well as a step-by-step guide to crafting an individualized solution. To me, it made perfect sense and could be boiled down to (a) know the requirements, (b) know *all* the options for meeting the requirements, including transfer credits from other schools (that perhaps have smaller classes or a looser curve), and (c) know yourself and how you learn best. The book contains excellent information about how to identify these 3 things, as well as how to gather any additional information that is necessary to optimize your chances for success. My only real complaint about the book is that it wasn't around when I was making my way through college! In addition to being a practical, problem-solving guide to getting the most out of college, this book provides a great introduction to (and largely

de-mystifies) the academic and bureaucratic side of the college experience. Most highly recommended!

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
