

Rick Steves is a wonderful travel writer, and his travel books are the only ones I read. Compared to other popular travel books which are dry and dull, Rick's books are like chatting with an old friend who has just returned from a fascinating journey. I've been reading Rick's guide to Germany every year since 2010, and I highly recommend that edition. The Best of Germany is a condensed, lighter version of the original guide. It's not as complete, containing roughly two-thirds of the information in the first book. On the other hand, The Best of Germany has far more colorful photos, and is easier to use while travelling. If you are coming to Germany for an extended stay, you may prefer the original guide. However, if you are planning a short visit, or trying to pack lightly for a backpacking trip, the Best of Germany may be your best choice. Both books are wonderful resources, and I hope you will enjoy whichever one you choose!

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
